PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Friends

As a young man I worked as an apprentice fitter and turner. I discovered the value of hard hands working with steel; they enabled me to work without developing blisters. I was far more productive in my work with hard hands. I guess that would also apply to the farmer working his fields.

On the other hand I have a friend who is an ophthalmologist. Every day he operates on people's eyes. He does so making use of sophisticated equipment requiring the utmost sensitivity to feel the smallest of movements with soft hands. I remember him telling me that in order to do his work well, he gave up playing the guitar; so as to avoid any kind of callouses developing on his hands because they can hinder the delicate work of eye surgery.

My point is even though callouses on your hands can be a real nuisance, they can be very useful. More and more I see the same principle being true in the life of a Christian. On the one hand we need to be hard; developing a resistance to evil and the works of the flesh. Whereas on the other hand we ought always to be soft; nurturing an openness to God and His working in our lives.

There is a delicate balance here as it is so easy to become hard and callous towards God and His Word and soft and open to the world and ungodliness. I have become more and more aware of this matter of appropriate hardness and softness. Let me explain, one example is that we can so easily focus on assessing sermons, services and ministry in general (good or bad, illustrated or boring, from the text or imported from elsewhere, sound mix good or bad, vocalists in tune or flat...) but completely miss what God is saying to us and doing in us.

Hardness can be hidden by focusing on the means or method and neglecting the actual end intended by God. This kind of practice is evidence of dullness in spiritual matters; whereas softness or tenderness is evident by humble, honest responses to the Word and work of God.

Therefore, as another year draws to an end I want to urge us as a church, as Peter does, to nurture our minds and hearts: 1 Peter 3:8 - Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind.

God's work in us is not complete by this date or that date but it continues until He calls for us or comes for us: *Philippians 1:6 - And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.*

COMPEL THEM TO COME IN

In the Parable of the Great Banquet, the Lord Jesus Christ informed His followers, that many guests, who had been invited to the banquet, turned down the invitation, citing a variety of excuses. The host then instructed his servants:

"GO INTO THE HIGHWAYS AND HEDGES AND COMPEL THEM TO COME IN."

(Luke 14:15-24)

I believe that we, as Christians, should take His injunction to heart and be prepared to leave our cosy, comfort zones in order to take the message of Salvation to needy people, where they are.

Public areas, such as shopping malls, laundrettes, parks, thoroughfares, etc., where people congregate, often provide golden opportunities for making meaningful contact with people, who very often would never dream of entering the door of a church.



An evangelism team decided to reach out to folk outside a shopping complex in Arcadia. They encountered two young men, chatting on the pavement. The team leader approached them and after introducing themselves, they struck up a conversation with the men. In response to a query as to where they lived, one of the contacts pointed out a tall block of flats, situated in a street adjacent to the one where they were standing. He gave his contact details and residential address to the team and extended an invitation for us to visit him in his home.

The team made an appointment to visit him the following week. On our arrival at the block of flats we encountered extremely tight security measures at the entrance and were only admitted to the building, after our contact vouched for the legitimacy of our visit and escorted us personally to his abode.



We spent some time building a friendly relationship with him, during which we became aware that, notwithstanding the fact that he frequented a church in the vicinity, he lacked assurance of personal salvation. Having obtained his permission, the Good News was shared with him. We were interrupted by a loud knock on the door of the flat. (Note:

Experience has shown the enemy frequently tries to obstruct the process of sharing the Gospel by creating a diversion through an unexpected caller, telephone call, etc.)

In this case, the caller was a young lady, who had come to pay a visit to our host. We made her feel at home, before retracing our steps and in the process established that she was also in need of salvation. What a joy it was to see them both praying for forgiveness and placing their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour.

Follow-up visits, confirmed that they had both experienced assurance of salvation. It should be mentioned that on our arrival at the young lady's flat, for the follow-up visit, we found three of her friends were also present. The Good News was shared with the group all of whom accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour! We joined the angels of God in praising God for saving these precious souls.

Iesus said:

"THERE IS JOY IN THE PRESENCE OF THE ANGELS OF **GOD OVER ONE** SINNER WHO REPENTS." (Luke 15:10)



Let us heed the call of Lord Jesus Christ:

Morning Service Time to Change at the Arcadia Campus

The Arcadia church campus will from 8 December 2013, for the duration of the school holidays, have only one service at 10:30 a.m.. The single service at the Arcadia campus will then continue on a trial basis for a period of six months. This decision was agreed to during the recently held church business meeting in October. The new church time will be evaluated after six months before a firm decision is reached. The decision to have one service on a trial period was motivated by the desire to have one well attended vibrant service rather than two limping or struggling services. The leaders are spread thinly over three morning services which results in less

coherence of the three Arcadia services. There had also been a decline in numbers at the 8 a.m. service since the Hill campus was started. One morning service at Arcadia also allows then for one pastor to cope with preaching, and the other to be more focused on member care. There has also been additional pressure placed on the worship teams which would be fine if the services were growing. Sunday School and Bible Study hour for grown-ups will continue to take place at 09:00 each Sunday, apart from during school holidays when neither will occur. The evening service and the service times at the Hill campus will remain the same: 6.00 p.m. and 8.30 a.m. respectively.

Youth Pastor Identified

On Sunday the 10th of November, members of Central Baptist Church voted that a call be extended to AJ and Aven Meiring for them to consider coming to Central as the youth pastor.

AJ, as he is popularly known, faced a panel of twelve members of Central for a two hour interview, after which the call committee agreed that their names be taken to the church for consideration. He

is currently serving with Cambridge Baptist Church in East London, while his wife Aven is completing her teaching degree at the University of Fort Hare in the Eastern Cape. AJ and Aven are 27 and 23 years old respectively

If they accept Central's offer, it is hoped that they will move to Pretoria in the first quarter of 2014.




She clearly states that the home has been the place where their children were taught the basics of sitting still; listening; obedience; quiet activities and especially understanding what she and her husband expected of them. The Pipers found that the greatest stumbling block for children in worship is that their parents do not cherish the hour. So the parent sets the tone by *falling in love with worship*. Her comment that we (as parents) can't impart what we don't possess (a love for worship) is right on track.

In addition, in their family each child has a folder with crayons, pen, pencil and note book. Each child in the first five years has been taught to sit still and colour in and later take notes of what they hear. A trip to the bathroom before the service begins, is part of the routine of attending church. In their home preparation for church went on during the week. Talking about worship; identifying the worship leader by name; acquainting the children with who the pastor is and introducing the children to these people have all been part of their teaching their children about church.

At the end of a service there is praise for the children who have accomplished features instilled in them by their parents. Where necessary, comments were made when there was room for improvement!

The final paragraph makes me smile! For the child who has disregarded the *established family expectations* there is an

immediate trip to the most private place they can find. Then the deserved words are spoken and consequences administered as promised!


Off the Shelf:

God's Hidden Hand

Don't you just love true stories? I enjoy them because in them I see God's hidden hand in the lives of men and women whether they acknowledge Him or not. One such book that has just left me in awe of God's power reminding me that life is never scripted and that nothing lasts forever, is *The Boy Who Harnessed The Wind* by William Kamkwamba and Bryan Mealer. It is absolutely delicious if I can use that that word to describe a book. Plus it is humorous and manages to capture the beauty, simplicity and at times desperation of rural life in Africa.

Well, it is the biography of William Kamkwamba, a boy who had an idea that left the villagers in his rural Malawian village thinking he had lost his marbles. Even though William was born in a relatively able family, the famine that struck Malawi in 2006 left many poor if not dead. He was not able to go to school after high school since his family like many in rural Malawi had become very poor. On dropping out of school due to lack of school fees he says, "my greatest fear was coming


true: I would end up just like any other poor Malawian farmer labouring in the soil. Thin and dirty with hands as rough as animal hides and feet that knew no shoes". William's fear was that his life would amount to nothing, further noting that "my life would never be determined by me, but by rain and the price of fertilisers and seeds".



William had a passion for education and a curious mind that saw him undertake a project that would change his life forever. He constructed a crude windmill managing to supply electricity for his poor family. It is the kind of book that will make you laugh, cry and applaud human determination and resilience in the wake of adversity. For me it was

another stark reminder that God's hidden hand moves to turn around the tides of adversity, that as we say here in South Africa, 'one day is one day'. The book is available at Exclusive Books at less than R200, definitely a must read.

Another book that has brought the lesson of God's faithfulness is Josh McDowell's real life story in *Undaunted*. Incidentally there is now a movie with the same title about his life. Josh McDowell is a well-known American author and speaker who has worked with Campus Crusade in the US. In his



book *Undanted*, the author manages to capture the sadness of his life growing up with an alcoholic father and a mother who stayed even when her husband would beat her so frequently. In fact the memories of his mother being beaten by his dad remain etched in his mind. Needless to say, as a result, Josh hated God and had such a poor esteem that he stuttered as a child. For him, the Christian message was a sham and to support this, he set out on a journey to prove that there is no God. It was this journey that changed his life forever as narrated in the book. *Undaunted* is available at CUM Bookstores at the good price of about R160; I would recommend it.

Bad things happen to people, Christians and non-Christians alike; like many people, I have wondered why such things happen. I have found comfort and encouragement in books such as *Undaunted* and *The Boy Who Harnessed The Wind* because in them I am able to see God's hidden hand at work in the lives of people whether they acknowledge him or not. I find such hope when I read how God restores and rewrites people's lives; it is why I enjoy true stories.

12 WAYS TO RUIN YOUR CHILD

This following letter, attributed to "a Grandfather from Klipvallei", appeared in The Citizen newspaper. Submitted by Noel Woodbridge.

I am enclosing something which, if published, may help a lot of parents who have teenagers. It says: "These 12 rules for raising delinquent children", and was issued by the Houston, Texas, police department.

- 1) Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living.
- 2) When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think that he is cute. It will also encourage him to pick up "cuter phrases" that will blow off the top of your head later.
- Never use a rod to chastise him.
- 4) Give the child all the spending money he needs. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
- 5) Do not compel him to attend church or Sunday School. Do not teach him to pray or read the Bible. Rather let him take a rest, seeing that he is tired. When he comes of age, he can decide for himself.
- 6) Let him read any printed matter he can lay his hands on, and allow him to defile his mind and spirit on this garbage.
- 7) Quarrel and fight frequently in the presence of

your children. In this way they will not be shocked when the home is broken up later.

- 8) Pick up everything he leaves lying around books, shoes, clothes. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on others.
- 9) Satisfy his every craving for food, drink, and comfort. See that every sensual desire is satisfied. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.
- 10) Take his part against neighbours, teachers, policemen and the pastor. They are all prejudiced against your child.
- 11) Avoid using the wrong word. It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
- 12) When he gets into real trouble, apologise for yourself by saying I never could do anything with him since childhood.

For whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap, 2 Samuel 18-33, and as Kind David went, he said this: "O my son Absolom, O my son Absolom" 2 Samuel 18-33. The heading of this pamphlet is, "How to ruin your child."

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
