

The Hill Campus was launched in June 2012 during which approximately 250 people were in attendance. The guest speakers were Rev Ian Stuart representing the BNA, Rev Rick Inglis representing the BU and Rev Riaan Niemandt representing the local pastors. Pastor Charles and Pastor Eric also addressed the meeting with Pastor Charles giving a brief history on the genesis of the Hill Campus.

If it was not for God's prompting and men and women dreaming and taking leaps of faith, there would be no Central Baptist Church today. We exist today as a congregation because of men and women, who with the help of God, established a church in Pretoria more than 120 years ago. So it is was not out of character when Central decided to dream and step out in faith in order to spread the word of God across the world. This time the dream was to expand, start a new 'Central' that was going to be different. This dream led to the establishment of our new Hill Campus far east of Pretoria beyond Hans Strijdom (renamed to Solomon Mahlangu) Avenue.

It all started in November 2008 when the idea to relocate the current Central Baptist Church was proposed during a leaders retreat. The discussion was that even though Central would

relocate, a witness in the downtown area of established. Pretoria would be investigation to acquire new property and a plan to build the capacity of a second morning service was started. Two weeks later during the monthly leaders meeting, a new proposal was tabled. Relocation was discarded and the leadership approved in principle the expansion of Central Baptist Church. All were in agreement that: a new church plant in the eastern suburbs of Pretoria is started, City Baptist Church is strengthened and the present strategic ministry in Schoeman (renamed to Frances Baard) Street is maintained.

Unlike in the past where Central established separate autonomous churches, the expansion of Central was going to be different. Central was going to plant a satellite campus and become what is known as a multi-site church. "This means that as a multi-site church, Central would

have church meetings at multiple locations. In the same way that we have three different congregations meeting at Schoeman Street every Sunday, we would add another congregation at a different venue but still very much part of the Central family" said Pastor Charles. Under this form of expansion the new church would be like a fourth congregation hence sharing the leadership, business meetings, finance and missions. With all this in place, the leadership was now left with the task of finding a suitable venue for the fourth congregation, the new 'Central'.

Word got round that Central was in the market for a new church site so it was no surprise when Mr. Archie van Dyk called Pastor Charles with the prospects of a site down Atterbury Road beyond Hans Strijdom. At that time, the leadership felt the location was not ideal. That was not the end of the story, an elder called Pastor Charles saying "kyk is vry" (it won't cost anything to look). So a site visit was made to view the property and according to Pastor Charles, "there was no doubt in our minds that the property was suitable for our plans". The entire leadership then visited the site and the enthusiasm grew. There was however one 'tiny' problem, the question of financing the project. Subsequent visits to the site were made and it was one such visit that turned the tide of things.

During this visit, the late Edgar Droste, a friend of Central who had been in property development, was invited to accompany the leaders. The objective was to seek his advice as to the value and soundness of the property and building. Thankfully, he thought it was a bargain even saying that if Central did not purchase the property he would do so himself. Then he enquired how Central would finance the project and in response was told that the property was going for R5.5 million and Central had R2.2 million. The R2.2 million was from the sale of the church manse, "at that time, we had no idea where the rest of the money would come from" says Pastor Charles. But God knew, Mr. Droste then offered a R3 million gift. This then was the provision to purchase the property, leaving Central with the challenge to raise money for the re modelling of the warehouse. When the

proposal to purchase the land was taken to the church in October 2009, it was unanimously agreed to proceed with the purchase of the property.

On 1 March 2010 the new site was formally acquired. In May 2010 a building committee under the chairmanship of Dave Temple was established. To convert the warehouse to what it is today, a loan of R960 000 was acquired and a cottage at the Glenhaven was sold for R515 000. Additional money was raised in and through the church family.

Like any normal construction project, it was not smooth sailing; the rezoning was a nightmare. The final rezoning was published in the government gazette as recently as 30 May 2012. The estimated cost of re-modelling the warehouse started at R400 000 and ended up in excess of R2 million.

Apart from the challenge of the rezoning, there was the issue of what the new 'Central' would be Thankfully this had no financial implication and it was unanimously agreed that it would be called the 'Hill Campus'. Whilst it has not been an easy road, Pastor Charles notes that, "there can be no doubt, the good hand of the Lord has been with us in bringing this about. He shown His providential leading and provision again and again". All the hurdles were worth it because today, in place of the warehouse stands a beautiful church building complete with a green reception area for church functions, a fully equipped and functional kitchen and a tastefully furnished mother's room that gives mothers an opportunity to be part of the church service while the children play.

Well the journey continues and the dream lives on and in the word of Pastor Charles, "I thank God that Central continues to dream. I thank God for putting this in our hearts to do His work to the glory of His name. Let us move forward with the same attitude of those who have gone before".

"Our help is in the name of the Lord who hath made heaven and earth. This is the Lord's doing and it is marvellous in our eyes. Blessed be the name of the Lord from henceforth and ever forever."

RIGHT ON THE DOT

"Rest in the LORD, and wait patiently for him..." Psalm 37:7

Have you ever had moments when you knew that God was with you "right on the dot"? Not that He ever leaves us. He is always with us but are there times when you need Him most, right at the nick of time, you sense His presence and leading?

I've had moments like that. I can remember not long after my husband and I were married we were traveling and our car broke down. It was late at night and we were out in the middle of nowhere with no one to help us; no cell phones back then. It was so dark, I remember being so scared and just praying and praying. I'm not sure how long we were stuck but it seemed like an eternity. Then all of a sudden a man and a lady pull up out of nowhere and helped us. The man knew just what to do and helped my husband. As soon as he had helped us, we looked up and the two were gone and everything was pitch black again. I always tell my husband that they were angels, whether they came straight down from heaven or not, I don't know. Whoever they were, I know God sent them "right on the dot".

There have been other things in my life, big and small when I knew that the Lord was leading and moving just in the nick of time. Sometimes we may not even be aware of God moving or how something worked out so timely. I'm so glad God knows what we need in our lives and when we need it. God has a way of moving and weaving things so that they work together at just the right moment. God's timing is so perfect for us as His children.

The Bible has a lot of examples of how God moved 'right on the dot'. For example Sarah, God's timing in giving her a baby at her age I'm sure didn't make sense to her. Yet it happened according to what God wanted. The bible says, "Is anything too hard for the LORD? At the time appointed I will return unto thee, according to the time of life, and Sarah shall have a son." Genesis 18:14.

Then there is the Shunammite Woman whose story can be found in 2 Kings Chapter 8. The prophet, Elisha, had brought the woman's son back to life and proceeded to tell the woman there would be a famine in the land for seven years and so she should go away with her family to avoid the famine. After the seven years was up, she returned and had to go before the king in order to plead for her land to be returned to her. At that very moment the king was talking to Gehazi, Elisha's servant. Then, the woman appeared before the king to ask for her land and Gehazi told the king that she was the woman whose child had been brought back to life. What happened? The king restored everything to her. Actually this is how the Bible in 2 Kings 8:6 records it, "...so the king



appointed unto her a certain officer, saying, restore all that was hers, and all the fruits of the field since the day that she left the land, even until now". The appearance of the woman just when Gehazi was talking about her to the King was not an accident, it was God's perfect timing, 'right on the dot'.

Then there is Lazarus, I'm sure Mary and Martha didn't think Jesus was where He needed to be at the right time. Maybe they thought that if Jesus had been at the right place at the right time, then Lazarus would not have died. Martha told Jesus, "Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died" John 11:21. Often we question why, when, and how the Lord works in our lives. But we have to realise He is in control and knows what He is doing. What did Jesus tell His disciples on their way to see Lazarus? "And I am glad for your sakes that I was not there, to the intent ye may believe; nevertheless let us go unto him" John 11:15. This was an opportunity for God to get

the glory and for others to see what Jesus could do and Who He was. I'm sure you know the story and how Jesus brought Lazarus back to life. Everything in the story of Lazarus was in God's timing with God's purpose at the forefront.

We too have to wait on God's timing. Sometimes, I believe we think God should work instantly using the most efficient and fast means possible but God does not work that way. He is Sovereign. You and I have to go by His plan and not ours. What I have found so wonderful is that as His children, He knows us, our need (s) and the best time for the need (s) to be met. He sees the big picture and knows how every little thing in our lives is going to work with other circumstances and events. We may want to run ahead or lag behind His plan but the Lord is always 'right on the dot'.

I arrived at the Faerie Glen Nature Reserve before 07:00 on a Saturday morning to find the parking lot jam-packed with motor vehicles, including two huge double-decker buses. I surmised that a large group of people had gathered there for some special occasion.

The sight and sounds of traffic were soon muffled by the ambient sounds of nature and the sight of trees and shrubs putting on their fresh green spring garb. The air was heavy with the scent of wild flowers, bursting forth into life after one of the severest winters we have experienced during the past decade.

It was good to see some of the birds, which had migrated to the north, returning to their summer habitat. A bustle of activity in the long reeds growing in the wetland area of the reserve betrayed dozens of small grey coloured birds, which to the inexperienced bird watcher, would not denote anything of real interest. On closer inspection it became clear that these were Red Bishops, which had not yet donned their bright red breeding plumage, searching for suitable nesting sites.



proportions, gargantuan nest constructed of a tangle of grass, sticks and other bric-brac, firmly wedged in the fork of a weeping willow tree caught my attention. This ungainly structure had taken a pair of Hamerkops weeks to construct. Whilst the female incubated her eggs inside the nest a noisy pair of Egyptian geese took up residence on top of the nest. A pair of Glossy Ibises (Hadidahs), perched on a branch adjacent to the nest, added their piercing cries to the persistent honking and hissing of the geese. (It would appear that the problem of not being able to choose one's neighbours is not unique to the human race!)



As I went on my way, the cacophony of birdcalls faded away in the distance. The spectacular sight of Swallows swooping gracefully, hither and thither in hot pursuit of flying insects, with such precision that one could imagine witnessing a choreographic display, synchronised to music, inaudible to human beings. They are certainly harbingers of the arrival of a new season!

My reverie was rudely interrupted by the sound of human voices emanating from the summit of the Bronberg and echoing in the valley below. On scanning the mountaintop I spotted a large group of people silhouetted against the skyline. I later encountered some of the members of that group as they descended the mountain, and conversed with



them. They told me that they belonged to a Christian Church consisting of more than a thousand members, based in Centurion and that a group of approximately one hundred young adults had spent several hours praying and worshipping the Lord on the mountaintop, I trust that this is symbolic of a new season in our country, where attention is focused on the Lord, instead of on fickle politicians who make vain promises, which they know they will not keep.

I am grateful to the Lord for giving Central the vision to commence an extension work in the far east of Pretoria. This area is expanding rapidly, with thousands of people taking up residence in the numerous housing estates in that area. There is tremendous potential for the extension of the Kingdom of God and many opportunities for ministry in that community.

WHAT AN EXCITING NEW SEASON IN THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH! Let us pray earnestly that the Holy Spirit will equip and empower us to be effective witnesses, like believers in the early Church: "Constantly praising God and being in favour and goodwill with all the people; and the Lord kept adding daily those who were being saved from spiritual death" (Acts 2:47 Amp).

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BEING A SWEET AROMA / FRAGRANCE / SCENT FOR CHRIST

During this year's National Baptist Convention held in July, Sylvia Thantsha, the ministry leader for Apples of Gold Polokwane, delivered a sermon to about 600 ladies of the Baptist Convention. I had the opportunity to go through her notes and I helped her with the editing .We had a wonderful time of prayer over this topic, "Being a Sweet Aroma for Christ", based on 2 Corinthians 2:14. I was so encouraged and blessed by the contents of her sermon that I decided to share part of it.

The journey to becoming a sweet aroma begins with being in tune with the Holy Spirit. Paul was sensitive to the Holy Spirit, he obeyed the prompting of the Holy Spirit and left what seemed like good ministry for what God had as better ministry. Obedience is critical if one is to become a sweet aroma. Paul in Romans 12:1 and 2 says, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." We are to dedicate everything about ourselves to God.

It is Jesus who makes us an aroma of His presence. God wants us to be fragrant people in order for us to be His ambassadors, which for Paul meant "for to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain" (Philippians 1:21). It means we rely on

God's power to strengthen us because Paul says in Romans 8: 31 and 37, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" God's will is not for us to live defeated lives but rather for us to be strong and victorious through him!

In order to produce a fragrance a number of processes are involved: cutting a tree, removing the gum and then beating the gum till it is a fine powder. Thereafter, sweet and sour spices are mixed into the powder and the mixture is then heated in order for it to release a fragrance. This set of processes before the final product is produced, is a reminder of some of the difficulties and refinements that we need to go through in order to be a fragrance that pleases the Lord and others with whom we come in contact. We often have to go through hurt, emotional cutting, beating, heating, mixing and heating again before we can become a pleasing aroma. The tree cutting represents the suffering and the sacrifice. It was through the sacrifice and suffering at the cross that our salvation was purchased. Suffering in the life of a Christian is



an essential part if one is to release Christ's fragrance to bless others.

Christ had to pass through experiences of beating and bruising before the full fragrance was released to God and men. The beating of the bark/wood is followed by heating if the fragrance is to be released, and how we respond to pressure (heating) can release a pleasing fragrance to God and to the world. Mixing sweet and sour spices is what gives a good perfume aroma, not over sweet, and in relation to life, we need to trust God when He says in Romans 8:28 that He works ALL things together for the good of those who love Him and are called according to His purposes? Sometimes we may not understand why bitter experiences make us better. 1 Thessalonians 5:18 tells us to "give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you".

We need to endure suffering for Christ's sake. James 1:12 says, "Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him". Throughout the whole process of making a fragrance, only the perfumer is given the responsibility of mixing the perfume; it is God who works in our lives to make us pleasing aromas. Fragrances are important to God, in Exodus 30:37-39, He gave a formula for making the incense to be burned on His altar, a unique aroma that was never to be imitated or used for any other purpose. The wood had to be beaten very small so it could release the fragrance. It was mixed by the perfumer for best results. The heavenly fragrance is unique, nobody can imitate it. It is the result of a life in close fellowship with God.



We are the carriers of the perfume - the perfume of the knowledge of Christ. The perfume of Christ can only be acquired by those who live in the place of intimate communion with Him. The questions are, are we prayerful, do we savor the presence of God? A magnificent scripture referring to the fragrance of incense is Revelation 5:8 "and when He (the Lamb – Jesus), had taken the scroll, the 4 living creatures and 24 elders fell down before the Lamb, each holding a harp, and golden bowls of incense, which are the prayers of the saints." How wonderful, our prayers, as believers are like precious perfume to God! Always remember the power of prayer as shown so clearly in Revelation 5:8 – that the prayers of the saints are like incense to God. As we commune with Jesus, we are cleansed and are filled with Holy Spirit, let us spread the fragrance wherever He leads us!

Through this encouraging sermon, I was reminded that as Christians we are called to release Christ's fragrance every day. At the conclusion of the meeting each lady was given a small perfumed soap cross or praying hands to remind them to be 'the aroma of Christ' to the world.

What are the characteristics of a perfume?

- It should make you smell nice.
- The perfume can either smell good or bad.
- The fragrance will attract some people and repel others.
- It's not the cover or the beautiful bottle that makes it smell good but the origin.
- The perfume is not affected by the surroundings. It does not take on its scent from what is round about. Its fragrance is released freely without taking account of its surroundings.
- Cannot be described, can be recognized.
- Cannot be measured, it's a matter of quality not quantity that matters.
- It makes people yearn to possess the secret of this scent.



As the plane took off, the island lay below us outlined by the turquoise coloured ocean and the gentle white line of the waves breaking over the coral reef. When we could no longer see it, indescribable emotions and a myriad of questions rushed through our minds. Where was God leading us? Will we ever see our beloved island, colleagues, brothers and sisters again? When...? What if ...?

The day after our arrival in South Africa, Pieter's eye fell on this quote from a sugar bag in a coffee shop: 'Giving up doesn't always mean you are weak. Sometimes it means that you are strong enough to let go'. This simple quote encouraged us greatly. After fighting the denial of our permit with every possible resource at our disposal, we came to a point one night where we had to give up and face the reality of returning. By his grace, God gave us the strength we needed to let go of our dreams, vision, our island, its beloved people and follow Him into the unknown.



Back in South Africa, we received great support and encouragement from SIM, our sending church, various supporters, family and friends. Though we felt uncertain regarding the future, these people assured us of their prayers and assistance. The security provided by this network of friends enabled us to take one step at a time into the uncertain future and gradually see God's plan for our family unfolding.

When our new term of service commences in September 2012. we will responsibility for the French speaking islands in the Southern African Region, working from the SIM Region of Southern Africa (ROSA) office. These islands include Mauritius, Madagascar and Reunion. Each island is at a different stage in ministry development and we are responsible for assisting the missionaries there. We remain full-time missionaries, depending on financial support, but with an enlarged responsibility towards the islands.

God is always at work to accomplish his glory and purposes. Sometimes we need to suffer discomfort, loss or hardship so that He can put His plans into motion, for the sake of His glory and purposes. What we had to suffer is almost insignificant in comparison to what others go through, yet the sense of loss was and still is, But we are grateful to God for showing us where He plans to use us next and pray that we will do so faithfully.

A NATIONAL ONLINE SURVEY ON BIBLICAL LITERACY LAUNCHED

The Biblical Literacy survey will probe three issues from the target group - how and the extent to which they read or study the Bible, whether they believe the content of the Bible and the extent to which they apply the Bible. "I am convinced that the results will greatly assist our denominational leaders to make any appropriate interventions which may be necessary" added Reuben as he is fondly known in Central. Recently eight of us from Central teamed up with the Word of Life Church in Vereeniging to run a one week holiday bible club in the picturesque town of Magogong located in the Northern Cape between Vryburg and Jan Kempdorp. Two townships were targeted, Bonita Park where the Central's team and part of Word of Life ran the outreach and Pampierstad which was reached by a Word of Life team.

The first day of the mission at Bonita Park was anything but encouraging, we arrived to find no kids and only one volunteer from the community. Marno Kirstein, Celia (a local volunteer) and I jumped into the van and drove around with a megaphone calling the kids to come. The megaphone seemed to have

worked because at the end of that day we managed to attract more than 100 children. The life of Peter in the Bible was the theme of the holiday club. Through the use of puppets, music, games, art and crafts and of course Bible lessons we were able to share the gospel with children from Bonita Park. I must say that living in Bonita Park is not easy because it is a difficult community with much unemployment, alcoholism and poverty. Children often believe in solving their problems with violence.

In total we reached 250 children with the gospel and three children gave their lives to God. We are very grateful and I believe that good seed was planted and that God will continue to work in the hearts of the children.





GLENHAVEN

A Mission Field?

"I have been a Christian all my life and attended church faithfully. However, if I had died two years ago I would have gone to hell! It is only since coming to Glenhaven that I have heard the Gospel."

A resident at Glenhaven

Glenhaven is the first and largest retirement centres that are administered by Central Association Church Welfare **Baptist** (CEBACWAS). There are approximately 235 men and women resident at Glenhaven, some married some not. Some live in cottages, some in flats, some in bed-sitters and some in the care unit. Some residents own their units while others are renting their units. Even though the population at Glenhaven is mixed, majority are female. Some are older, 90+ and others younger 60+. Some are English speaking, some speak Afrikaans and others a home language that is something else. Some drive their own cars and others make use of the Glenhaven bus.

In terms of faith, some are regular Church attenders while others are not. Some are born again believers, some just know about Jesus and others have little or no interest in Christianity. Even though there are many different denominations represented at this retirement centre, the thrust of Glenhaven is unashamedly Christian. To this end, some of

us who are born again have formed a 'Spiritual Ministries Committee' made up of members from different denominations so 'that by all possible means we may win some' for God's Glory.

The Spiritual Ministries Committee is very active and is responsible for many and varied activities. The committee's chairman is the appointed Glenhaven chaplain. chaplain his duties include visiting all new residents, those in hospital or sick at home as well as those recently bereaved. The chaplain also helps residents any experiencing spiritual problems and generally prays with residents when needed.

Some of the activities that are undertaken by the committee include ensuring there are preachers for the well-attended Sunday morning and evening services. Offering taken during these services is budgeted for and donated to various organisations and people. Some of the beneficiaries are the Bible Society, Radio Pulpit, Trans World Radio, Leprosy Mission, Scripture Union, Lauren McGill and P. Vorster (in Upington). Any expenditure related to ministry such as speakers fees comes out of the offering collected during the services. For the frail and sick not able to attend the church services, recorded bible readings in English and Afrikaans are played each week in the Care Unit Lounge. Prayer meetings are held once a week in English and once a week in Afrikaans in the hall. Three different bible studies are held led by different people, on different days and at different times each week.

In order to promote 'giving' among the residents, a 'Food and Blanket Fund' was set up. This fund collects money, as well as residents. items from for monthly distribution to different needy institutions. Residents are encouraged to give to those less fortunate.

Every resident receives a birthday card on their birthday from the Spiritual Ministries Committee; bereaved families also receive a sympathy card.

A Friendship Circle has been formed to give

help to residents and staff in the Care Unit, repair garments, take residents for walks, and other help where needed. At Christmastime, items made by cottage residents, distributed to every care unit resident. Visits are frequently made to shut in's and lonely folk in the Care Unit. Tracts and printed prayers are made available to them. A Hobbies class meets monthly giving residents something to do. Corridor tea parties are arranged at Easter and a

Spring family day party at the beginning of September. All these outreach activities aim to improve the spiritual, mental, physical and social wellbeing of the Care Unit residents.

Music Ministry is well accepted. A choir that sings at Christmas time, on other special occasions and when asked to do so, is much enjoyed by all. The Corridor Choir sings every quarter in the Care Unit, others join in with choir members to treat the residents.

Numerous other activities are arranged to keep residents involved, active, and interested. The annual Fete not only raises much needed finance to help those folk in the care unit whose pensions no longer cover their fees, but fulfills this need.

It is the intention of the Spiritual Ministries Committee that every resident who lives at Glenhaven, gets the opportunity to hear the gospel. We pray that the beauty of Jesus may be seen in every resident who knows Jesus as Lord. We "do not want anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance".



CONFESSIONS

of a Youth Minister

Having been in youth ministry for a while, I can confirm that it is not a training ground for those interested in becoming 'real ministers' in future. In addition, contrary to what some may think, youth ministry is not where one serves with little regard for one's consequences. Instead I am convinced it is not for the weak but for the strong and mature. I will tell you why, the stakes are high, the challenges are enormous, and the cost is great.

The stakes are high because as much as teenage years can be tumultuous, they are also years of potential. A youth minister therefore has the opportunity to lay the right foundation to prepare a teen for his or her adult life. For us Christians, the right foundation is the one that will yield a God centred life filled with joy. As teenagers navigate through life there is a lot they have to deal with, choices they have to make and sometimes, they are easily influenced towards a self-destructive lifestyle. This is because human beings come hard wired to sin; we come with that 'default setting'. Only God can turn around a life set on the road to destruction.

This is why as I minister to teenagers, I often ask myself 'how will I influence the teens this week?' I am constantly aware that they check out my every action, word and attitude. One badly expressed comment about the perverseness of lust can plunge a teen struggling with pornography into despair. A bad joke about being fat overheard by a teen struggling with self-image can negatively affect the teen's perception of image in the Lord. For a girl, her perception of beauty can darken her understanding of beauty in the Lord. Since I am constantly under the teens microscopic eyes, I have learnt that the youth ministry is not a place where I can adopt a casual attitude about mistakes.

Youth ministry is marked with enormous challenges and apart from pornography and image

issues, some teens struggle with drunkenness, premarital sex, drugs and homosexual relations. Unfortunately for some teens these issues are not a source of struggle but rather a lifestyle that is enjoyed. The question is how does one reach teens and show them the consequences of a life that is set on the road to destruction? How does a youth minister show teens that only Jesus truly satisfies, that no one is beyond redemption and the love of God in Jesus Christ? Essentially the answer is easy — the gospel, but an easy answer doesn't mean that it is easily applied.

The flip side is that a teen may not engage in self-destructive practices yet may be living a life separated from God. Christian parents face the danger of being lulled into a false sense of security when they have well behaved church going teenagers whose hearts may be so far from God. Such parents may be so happy to have a 'good teen' that the state of their teen's heart is not a matter of concern. Also teens may be deluded to believe they are on good ground with God because they come from a Christian family and read their Bibles. A youth minister has to find ways of warning the 'good' teen about the dangers of self-righteousness.

Simply put, youth ministry is difficult and without God's grace youth ministers have no hope. It is a costly ministry in terms of time, money and energy and sometimes the rewards are low if present. It can also be emotionally draining, burdensome and hurtful especially when one sees the teens getting hurt. So, you may wonder why I am in youth ministry. I'll tell you why, my heart is captivated by the love of God in Jesus Christ. I have a passion to see others come to know the same love through the same gospel. Youth ministry is my joy and I honestly love teenagers. I have been encouraged, humbled and honoured to serve in the youth ministry. My appeal to you is for you to pray for those of us involved in youth ministry.



To all Centralites, thank you for your prayers and donations. May the Lord bless you.






